This verse, the fulfilling of our Lord's desire, must be the lens and filter through which all aspects of life within our parish pass. Take the upcoming Aurora Greek Fest as an example. Why do we host this festival? What is its purpose: to bring all who attend to salvation and the knowledge of the truth. The festival isn't about food or even fundraising. It is about opening our doors so that people can enter our Church and meet Christ. Perhaps they meet Him in the warmth and hospitality of our volunteer. STUMP THE PRIEST

My 3-yr old granddaughter questioned why the priest was wearing a "kapelo" during the liturgy, and why he removed it during the Great Entrance. I had no answers, but we're both looking forward to yours!

The black cylindrical hat that the clergy wear is called a Kalimavki, and is traditionally wom by all Orthodox clergymen; deacons, priests, and bishops. Celibate clergy and monks will also wear a black veil on top of their kalimavki. As a rule of thumb, clergy do not wear anything upon their heads while they are in the Holy Altar, with some specific exceptions (a bishop will wear his mitre, a celibate priest will wear his kalimavki and veil, and the deacon will wear his kalimavki during the great censing before the Great Entrance), but they will don their headwear when they are outside the Holy Altar (again with certain exception). For this reason, we are more accustomed to seeing Deacons wearing their kalimavki than Priests. Deacons spend the majority of their ministry outside of the Holy Altar on the Solea, and when they return to the Holy Altar periodically during the service, they will take their kalimavki off. During a typical Divine Liturgy, a married Priest will only wear his kalimavki when saying the dismissal from the royal gates.

The history and development of the kalimavki and other Orthodox headwear is quite interesting and tells us much about the effects of secular life upon the Church. Originally Orthodox dergy would not wear anything upon their heads, with the exception of monks who wore a veil but no kalimavki. As late as the 13th century, St. Symeon of Thessaloniki reports that the only dergymen in all of Orthodoxy who wears any type of hat or mitre is the Patriarch of Alexandria, and that this is an ancient tradition unique to that city. Following the fall of Constantinople to the Ottoman Empire, Christians within the empire faced varying degrees of limited acceptance and intolerance. One of the Ottoman tools of subjugation was the imposition of the kalimavki as a required article of clothing for all Orthodox clergy when they were in the public sphere. A visibly labeled people are easier to harass. This is a fact that oppressive regimes throughout history have known to be true.

Much like the Cross, the Orthodox clergy embraced the symbol of their persecution. Russian and Slavic Churches, which were never under the control of the Ottomans, adopted the kalimavki as part of their attire out of solidarity for their brothers who were being oppressed. By the time that the Ottoman empire fell, the kalimavki had become an accepted part of Orthodox Church's attire and a memorial to her time in captivity. The kalimavki had become so associated with the normal dress of Orthodox clergymen, that when the modem state of Turkey was established, its secular government, which sought to rid the country of religious observance, forbid Orthodox clergymen to wear it. What was once imposed on the Orthodox Church as an aid in oppression had now been taken away for that same reason.

If we look around the world, we see that the kalimavki, and its different cultural variations, is now considered standard in Orthodox attire, with the exception of in the United States. As the Orthodox Church came to the U.S. as an immigrant faith, its early adherents often times sacrificed religious identifiers for national identifiers. In the early 1900s in the U.S., a kalimavki communicated that you were foreign more than it communicated that you were an Orthodox clergyman. That seems to be changing in the last few generations of clergymen in the U.S. As Clergy are more secure in their national identity as Americans, the religious symbols that previous generations sacrificed for assimilation are making a return. With that re-embrace of Orthodox identifiers, the kalimavki is becoming more visible in Orthodox parishes around the U.S.

BOOK REVIEW



Reclaiming the Great Commission: A Roadmap to Parish Health

The original Greek word for fellowship is "koinonia" which is used to indicate the deep and intimate relationship shared by a group of people. When I read this sentence in this book by Father Evan Armatas, I immediately thought of our beloved St. Athanasios Church family.

Father Evan, in his insightful observations of how we live our faith while being impacted by American Christianity, brings the wisdom that he acquired by being a Greek Orthodox Priest for over 20 years, and his lifelong Orthodox Christian journey in America.

This book is inspired by Jesus' last words to his disciples "Go...and make disciples of all nations" (Matt. 28: 19-20). If you are curious as to how that commandment would be put into motion in a local parish community, this book portrays this with excellent illustrations. Anyone in our parish can benefit from the learnings described by Fr. Evan. The title includes the phrase "A roadmap to parish health" but this book offers more than a roadmap since it is an edifying spiritual guide to how we can journey closer to the Lord and a Life in Christ.

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
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
