

Journey to Pascha

We regularly use the imagery of Lent as a journey that brings us to Pascha and the Resurrection of Christ. Prayer, fasting, and almsgiving are the vehicles that carry us along the Lenten path. By purifying ourselves through these ascetic practices, we draw closer to Christ, and thereby join Him on His journey from Galilee to Jerusalem, from Jerusalem to the Cross, from the Cross to the Tomb, and from the Tomb to Resurrection. The hymns of Holy Week clearly illustrate this point.

He was saying to His Apostles on the way, "Behold, we are going up to Jerusalem, and the Son of Man shall be delivered up, as it is written of Him." Come therefore, and let us accompany Him, with purified minds, and let us be crucified with Him... (Palm Sunday Evening)

This makes our experience of Holy Week more than a simple remembrance of events long past. Holy Week and Pascha are events that we also experience and participate in. We accompany Christ and share in all His experiences, even Crucifixion. The ascetic practices of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving are the ways in which we symbolically are crucified with Christ. Our voluntary crucifixion and sharing in the Holy Week experiences of Christ are essential to our salvation. As St. Paul says in his Epistle to the Romans, "If we died with Christ, we believe that we shall also live with Him." So the journey of Holy Week is also about our path to the Cross and Resurrection.

There is no better path to the Cross than through the services of Holy Week. There we hear about Christ's journey: His actions, His prayers, His trials, and we are invited, as indicated in the hymn above, to join Him. The demands of our lives and responsibilities can make it a difficult to prayerfully attend all the services of Holy Week. However, if we crave to rise with Christ, then we must also die with Him. If we desire to be crucified with Him, we must walk alongside Him to the Cross. I challenge us to set aside our external duties and obligations for a week so that we can truly celebrate the Resurrection of Christ and the life we now share with Him.

Saturday of Lazarus Retreat APRIL 8, 2023 (10:30 AM)



I've heard that Orthodox Christians aren't allowed to wear crosses that show Christ on it. Is that true?

While the preference among Orthodox Christians is to wear a cross that does not have a depiction of Jesus being crucified, that is not true in all cases, nor is it "not allowed". As I said, we have a preference for a bare cross. This is because the bare cross reminds us that although Christ died on the cross, He was taken down, buried, and resurrected. Burial for crucified criminals was rare. More often, the Romans simply left the bodies on a cross until they fell down in various states of decomposition. So a bare cross worn by Orthodox Christians is a reminder of the care that His followers had for His body, and Christ's ultimate resurrection.

But that does not mean that wearing a cross with a depiction of Christ's body is prohibited. In fact if you look at most of the crosses worn by clergy, they typically do depict Christ during His crucifixion. Likewise, the handheld blessing crosses used by the clergy, are not bare, but have the body of Christ on them. By virtue of these clergy crosses being larger, they are often made with an image of the resurrection on the reverse. So the front portrays Christ's death and the back portrays His resurrection.

Either way, wearing a cross, be it a bare cross or a cross depicting the crucifixion, is a daily reminder of our Lord and His great mercy. Without the Cross there is no Resurrection and without the Resurrection the Cross is meaningless. One always points to the other. As long as we keep that in mind, we give glory to God.






Students: Participate in The Oratorical Festival


APRIL 5, 2023 (12 PM)

The St. John Chrysostom Oratorical Festival is a nationwide program of the Department of Religious Education (DRE) of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America, where Orthodox youth present speeches discussing the Greek Orthodox faith and the Church. Participants start at the Parish level, then proceed to the District or Metropolis level. And then, two finalists representing each Metropolis of the Archdiocese advance to the National Finals. Participants at the National Finals may be eligible for awards ranging from \$500 to \$2000. Our high school classes will be incorporating the topics of the Oratorical Festival to prepare our students with this competition.
