

#### **Praying Through Lent**

Few prayers are as synonymous with the Lenten season as the Lenten Prayer of St. Ephraim. Perhaps we may be familiar with this prayer, but I am sure that for many this will be an introduction. The Church adds the prayer of St. Ephraim all our weekday Lenten services, and also recommends that each individual should add this prayer to our own personal daily prayer rule for the period of the Fast.

So what is it about this prayer that makes it so central to Lent? It is the fact that this prayer is a perfect balance between overcoming our vices as well as cultivating the virtues. It asks for God's grace to turn from sin, and likewise His strength to turn toward righteousness. Throughout Lent as we focus on our spiritual growth in anticipation of the Resurrection, it can be difficult to balance both of these aspects. Often we tend to emphasize overcoming vice through practices like Holy Confession. But we must also wholeheartedly pursue the good. The first two verses of this prayer balance one another and keep us focused during Lent on the transformation that comes from both eliminating sin as well as nurturing goodness.

With the last verse of the prayer we are reminded to keep our attention focused on our own growth. The temptation during Lent is to compare ourselves to those around us. The phrase "keep your eyes on your own plate" is quite appropriate for Lent, and not just because of the practice of fasting.

Lastly the Prayer of St. Ephraim intentionally incorporates the practice of prostrations (making the sign of the Cross, kneeling, and touching our head to the floor). In reference to prostrations the 14th century Metropolitan Theoleptos of Philadelphia said, "Do not neglect prostration. It provides an image of man's fall into sin and expresses the confession of our sinfulness. Getting up, on the other hand, signifies repentance and the promise to lead a life of virtue." The act of prostration is a physical expression of the words we discussed above. They incorporate our bodies into the very prayer we are offering with our souls. In this way, our entire being is offering the prayer.

The prayer is as follows:

O Lord and Master of my life, take from me the spirit of sloth, despair, lust of power, and idle talk.

(Prostration)

But give rather the spirit of chastity, humility, patience, and love to Thy servant.

(Prostration)

Yea, O Lord and King, grant me to see my own transgressions, and not to judge my brother, for blessed art Thou, unto ages of ages. Amen. (Prostration)

As we walk through this Lenten season, I pray that you will embrace the Lenten Prayer of St. Ephraim as a daily part of your prayer life.

#### Saturday of Lazarus Retreat APRIL 8, 2023 (10:30 AM)





## **KYRA SARAKOTI (Lady Lent)**

Kyra Sarakosti is a Greek Lenten tradition used to help families teach their children about Lent. She is often made out of a dry dough or in this case a drawing that can be colored and decorated before being displayed in the house. She has no mouth or ears to show that she does not speak or listen to gossip. Her hands are held in prayer, and she has seven feet (one for each week leading up to Pascha). Every Saturday the family tears off one of the feet to help keep track of the remaining time in Lent. We encourage you to cut this page out of the Champion, decorate Kyra Sarakosti with your family, hang the drawing on your refrigerator or by your icons, and utilize this Greek tradition to enrich your family's Lenten experience this year.




## **BOOK OF THE MONTH**

**Book Review by Andre Castillo** 

The Orthodox Church: 455 Questions and Answers by Father Stanley S. Harakas is a great read for both Orthodox Christians and those outside of the church. The book is a revised compilation of questions and answers from a column in The Hellenic Chronicle newspaper covering topics arranged alphabetically, such as theology, ecclesiology, Holy Tradition, the scriptures, salvation, departure of the soul, church calendar, major feast days, the saints, church history, the national churches and ethnic traditions, social issues, medical issues, and prayer. It also has commentaries on western theology of why practices and doctrines differ from those of the Roman Catholics, Non-Chalcedonians and Protestants. All questions are answered specifically by clerics from the Greek Orthodox Church.

In my view, the best part of the book is its commentary on sacramentology and liturgics. In conclusion, while there is no substitute for spiritual guidance from a spiritual father, this book is a great tool for referencing any topic pertaining to the Orthodox Church and will be helpful for both new converts and lifelong Orthodox Christians alike to immerse themselves into all the church has to offer.

#### **Hesed House Dinner Service**




# Students: Participate in The Oratorical Festival


APRIL 5, 2023 (12 PM)

The St. John Chrysostom Oratorical Festival is a nationwide program of the Department of Religious Education (DRE) of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America, where Orthodox youth present speeches discussing the Greek Orthodox faith and the Church. Participants start at the Parish level, then proceed to the District or Metropolis level. And then, two finalists representing each Metropolis of the Archdiocese advance to the National Finals. Participants at the National Finals may be eligible for awards ranging from \$500 to \$2000. Our high school classes will be incorporating the topics of the Oratorical Festival to prepare our students with this competition.
