



#### Saint Peter's Chains

Without leaving Rome, thou didst come to us by the precious chains which thou didst wear. O foremost of the Apostles. And worshipping them with faith, we pray: By thine intercessions with God, grant us great mercy.

January sees the festivities of the Church take no post-Christmas hiatus. We proceed directly from Christ's birth to His baptism and then to the commemoration of a host of major saints in the Church: St. John the Baptist, St. Anthony the Great, Sts. Athanasios (our parish's patron) and Cyril of Alexandria, St. Gregory the Theologian, and the Three Hierarchs. But there is also a lesser-known feast of the Church that falls on January 16th. It is the celebration of St. Peter's miraculous escape from prison and the veneration of the chains he wore while in captivity.

Found in Chapter 12 of the Book of Acts, we read the account of Peter's imprisonment in Jerusalem. After seeing that the execution of the Apostle James pleased the enemies of the Church, Herod Agrippa had St. Peter arrested in order that St. Peter might share the same fate as St. James the Apostle. Yet, while in prison, an angel appeared to St. Peter by night. The angel miraculously released St. Peter from his chains and guided him to safety, mystically opening each of the prison doors as they approached. St. Peter found refuge in the house of the Evangelist Mark's mother, giving praise to God with all present on account of his deliverance from impending death.

Even after we have the good news of Christ's descent into Hades and release of all those held captive by sin, God reiterates this message symbolically through St. Peter's imprisonment and release. Just like those who had died before the coming of our Lord, St. Peter found himself ensnared by an evil foe. Bound, with no hope of escape, God sends help and unfastens the shackles which held him. Still, He does not leave St. Peter to his own devices to navigate the path to safety of his own accord. The one sent by God walks together with St. Peter to the open gate of his salvation.

This is the story of St. Peter. This is also the story of Christ and His descent into Hades. This is the story of each of us as we seek the Lord's help in releasing us from struggle, sin, and hardship. We do not walk alone in these times. Instead, we are guided by the help of God, who descends to the very point of our captivity and steers us toward salvation.

May we receive the same grace and guidance from the Lord in our times of need.

# STUMP THE PRIEST

# Can you explain the hand gesture that all the saints are making in our Icons?

Not all of the saints are making the same hand gesture in their icon, but the particular one that our question is about is the one we see most often and typically being made by Christ or a saint who was a bishop or priest. In fact, this hand gesture is not just reserved for icons. It is the same hand gesture that a priest makes whenever he is offering a blessing. You can see in the image that the fingers are held in such a way as to form the letters ICXC. For grammatical reasons, Ancient Greek abbreviations would use the first and last letters of a word. So ICXC is how you abbreviate the name Iŋσouς Χριστός Jesus Christ.

Now that we know what the symbol is, the next question is: why does the blessing in the Orthodox Church, either in iconography or in the actions of the priest, take the form of ICXC? This is because when a priest or saint blesses, we are blessing in the name of Christ ie it is Christ who is actually performing the blessing. That is why at the end of the Liturgy when the priest is distributing the antidoron he will say, "The blessing of the Lord..." because it is not the priest's blessing you are receiving, it is the blessing of Christ through the priest.

This tradition goes all the way back to the book of Acts when St. Luke records one of the prayers of a group of early Christians.

"Grant to Your servants that with all boldness they may speak Your word, by stretching our Your hand to heal, and that signs and wonders may be done through the name of Your holy Servant Jesus." (Acts 4:29-30)

The prayer makes it clear that the hand that is being stretched out to heal and work signs and wonders is God's hand, and that the things which are being done are being done through the name of Christ.



# **BOOK OF THE MONTH**

Creation and the Patriarchal Histories: Orthodox Christian Reflections on the Book of Genesis

Author Father Patrick Henry Reardon discusses a concise yet thorough walk-through of the first book of the Old Testament. For a book like Genesis which is consistently misunderstood in various ways by the contemporary reader, Father Patrick takes the time to present the proper understanding and context within the framework of a chapter-by-chapter discussion. The beauty of the content is his ability to convey the coherence of the Old and New Testaments as one book. Using quotes from the Holy Fathers, the Gospels, Epistles, and even Jewish historians like Josephus, he shows that the centrality of Christ the Messiah is as apparent in the Old Testament as it is in the New. The Old and New Testaments are a 'package,' with one being necessary to understand the other. He conveys creation and the world itself as God's 'writing,' and reminds the reader that the understanding of the Old Testament in general and Genesis in particular was not specific to the Christians, but was shared by the Jewish people also. Using the insight contained within this short book, Christians do not need to fear or 'talk around' the Book of Genesis within the context of the modern world.


# FROM THE LOFT

#### Music Theory of Theophany

Kali Hronia! I hope you had a blessed Christmas season with your family and friends.

The New Year begins with one of the most beautiful and important feast days in the church: Theophany, or the manifestation of the Holy Trinity at Christ's baptism in the Jordan River, on January 6. For this feast day, there will be a number of changes in the music from a "typical" liturgy. Most notable is the Apolitikion, which is sung during the Small Entrance. For Theophany, this is "En Iordani" or "When in the Jordan." The rich text of this hymn describes Christ's baptism and the presence of the Holy Trinity. Musically, this is represented in the rising and falling of the embellished melodic line, symbolizing heaven and earth. In fact, the melody and the "ison" (the repeated pitch that serves as a foundation for the melody) continue to meet on the same note, representing the union of heaven and earth. The final line is declamatory and exultant, with the highest notes being sung: "O Christ God, who appeared and illumined the world, glory to You."

Whether you come and join us in the loft, sing along from the pews, or simply take in these beloved hymns, I hope these articles will encourage you to listen for something new, something surprising, something beautiful - and therefore connect you more deeply to the liturgy and the Word of God.



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
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
