

By the waters of Babylon,
There we sat and wept
When we remembered Zion.
Upon the willows in her midst,
We hung up our musical instruments;
For there our captors asked us for words from our songs,
And those who carried us off said to us,
"Sing us the songs of Zion." (Psalm 136:1-3)

There is really only one story throughout the scriptures: the story of mankind's rebellion against God through sin, and God's eternal commitment to restoring us. Understood this way, we come to know that the story of the scriptures is in fact my story, lived out by so many others before me, but equally written by me.

Take for example our commemoration on the Sunday before Lent begins (this year, March 17th). On this day "we remember the expulsion of the first-formed Adam from the Garden of Eden" (Synaxarion of the day), and during the Orthros service the chanters proclaim:

"In times of old did Adam sit and cry in sorrow opposite the delights he had in Paradise; his hands did upon his forehead strike, as he said this: O merciful Lord, have mercy on me who have fallen."

Throughout the services this day, the Church makes it abundantly clear that the events of Adam's expulsion (Gen 3:17-24) are the result of him being led away by sin. Similarly the people of Judah, after generations of sin and rebellion against the worship of God, are defeated by the Babylonians, and led away (4 Kingdoms 25:11). Psalm 136 records a comparable scene to Adam sitting outside the gates of Paradise, narrating the Judeans sitting by the waters of Babylon, away from their holy city of Jerusalem (Zion).

These accounts from the scriptures speak about the pain that one feels when coming face to face with the consequences of rebellion against the Lord. Sin is nothing short of rebellion, rebellion against God, His commandments, His rule, His will for us. And when we allow ourselves to be led away in rebellion, we find ourselves far from the delights of Paradise and the dwelling of our Lord. Such an experience is not unique to Adam, or to the Judeans, but is my story as well.

However bleak this account may seem, it is not complete. The Judeans eventually return to their home and rebuild the temple that they had lost, this time wiser not to fall into idolatry. Likewise, the iconography of the Resurrection shows Christ lifting Adam out of his exile and returning him to Paradise. Therefore, return and resurrection are also aspects of my own story through Christ.

Ultimately this is what the Lenten season is about, grieving over how far I have been led astray, in order to begin the journey back to God. I pray that during the coming weeks we will reject sin, which has carried us away, so that we may share in the Lord's resurrection and our return to Paradise.



SCAN FOR APPOINTMENT





The Saturday of the Souls this year falls on the same date as the feast of the 40 Martyrs of Sebaste (March 9). In addition to the memorials that day, the relics of the 40 Martyrs will be available for veneration.

These holy Martyrs, who came from various lands, were all soldiers under the same general. Taken into custody for their faith in Christ, and at first interrogated by cruel means, they were then stripped of their clothing and cast onto the frozen lake which is at Sebastia of Pontus, at a time when the harsh and freezing weather was at its worst. They endured the whole night naked in such circumstances, encouraging one another to be patient until the end. He that guarded them, named Aglaius, who was commanded to receive any of them that might deny Christ, had a vision in which he saw heavenly powers distributing crowns to all of the Martyrs, except one, who soon after abandoned the contest. Seeing this, Aglaius professed himself a Christian and joined the Martyrs on the lake, and the number of forty remained complete. In the morning, when they were almost dead from the cold, they were cast into fire, after which their remains were thrown into the river. Thus they finished the good course of martyrdom in 320, during the reign of Licinius. These are their names: Acacius, Aetius, Aglaius, Alexander, Angus, Athanasius, Candidus, Chudion, Claudius, Cyril, Cyrion, Dometian, Domnus, Ecdicius, Elias, Eunoicus, Eutyches, Eutychius, Flavius, Gaius, Gorgonius, Helianus, Heraclius, Hesychius, John, Lysimachus, Meliton, Nicholas, Philoctemon, Priscus, Sacerdon, Severian, Sisinius, Smaragdus, Theodulus, Theophilus, Valens, Valerius, Vivianus, and Xanthias.


ORATORICAL FESTIVAL

What are the basic concepts of Generosity and how can we apply them to Stewardship as well as our everyday life? This is a timely and important topic being discussed by churches and stewardship committees around the Metropolis. Generosity is defined in the following manner ...

 Generosity reflects the gratitude we have to God for the gifts He has given us. It is not just about money; it is the generosity of volunteerism, dedicating time, and talents, as well.

In many ways, the basic concepts of Generosity are defined and embedded thought-out the Bible:

- Generosity is a Virtue Matthew 10:8
 - Freely you have received, freely give
- Generosity is a Practice Matthew 25:35-36
- Taking care of the hungry and thirsty, the homeless and hurting
- Generosity is Learned
 - Children watch and learn. We must teach them and encourage them to be Generous in their lives
- Generosity is more than Money
 - It is how we use our talents, our time for others, practice hospitality, offer encouragement, make connections
 - It is measured by our giving and volunteering
- Generosity is Transformative, Inspiring and Contagious
- Generosity is also a cornerstone of our Faith and our day-to-day life.
- "..and prepare your Generous gift beforehand, which you had previously promised, that it may be ready as a matter of Generosity and not as a grudging obligation." 2 Corinthians 9:5
- "So let each one give as he purposes in his heart, not grudgingly or of necessity; for God loves a cheerful giver" 2 Corinthians 9:7
